Council has roll called in members. We can see the new stream via their youtube which is being streamed by [@TV20Cleveland](#) .

The audio is terrible. One can hear multiple people talking at once and a loud electronic buzz.

Turns out it was Council President Kevin Kelly and forgot to use the microphone. He has stated that they will keep the room limited to 23 people and under.

Nora Kelly is talking and a resident of Ward 17. "I've been fortunate to helping and form Clevelanders For Public Comments. ... I want to provide a little window to our coalition."



Nora Kelly, "Despite multiple requests to President Kelly he has refused to meet with our group and has refused to acknowledge our groups."

[@Jesstrivisonno](#), a resident, is present and now talking, "It is flawed because it asks the Clerk to take on political decisions about the policy of public comment."



[@Jesstrivisonno](#) "That flaw can be addressed with a simple amendment. She reads the amendment. "Giving oversight to Council is important and protects the Clerk of Council...We have waited over 100 years for public comment and should waiting for a couple more months is worth it."



Diane Morgan, a resident, is present and is also a member of Clevelanders for Public Comment. She shares a story about a conversation with another resident who was shocked that we do not have public comments.



Morgan, "We need to have a clear, crystal procedure for citizens to come to Council meetings, have our testimonies recorded, submitted and presented. A good example is Akron. ... It is holding back citizens and engagement in our Government."

Morgan, "I'm asking we go back and look at the legislation we put together."

Rosemary Palmer of Ward 12 says a member of Council told her that we don't need public comment because they are often in the community. She recommends it



Michelle Jackson of Ward 4 is present and states, "As the proposed rule stands, no one should be taking a victory lap yet. From the begging we were advised that real policy happens in committee."



Mrs. Jackson, "A real rule change versus of a campaign talking point would prioritize public comment at committee meetings. Instead of Democratic Reform we have a reaffirmation of status quo. ... This body has the rare moment to do the transformative thing."

Randy Cunningham of Ward 11 is present and here in favor of CoPC proposal instead of Council's.

"The appearance of Democracy is what is valued in our society but real democracy confronts a blizzard of little things so that appearances do not become a reality.

Cunningham, "Little things with big consequences....The tyranny of little things has asserted itself. ... We have been petition City Hall for a public comment for most of the year. We have been told the proposed ordinance needs more research and vetting."



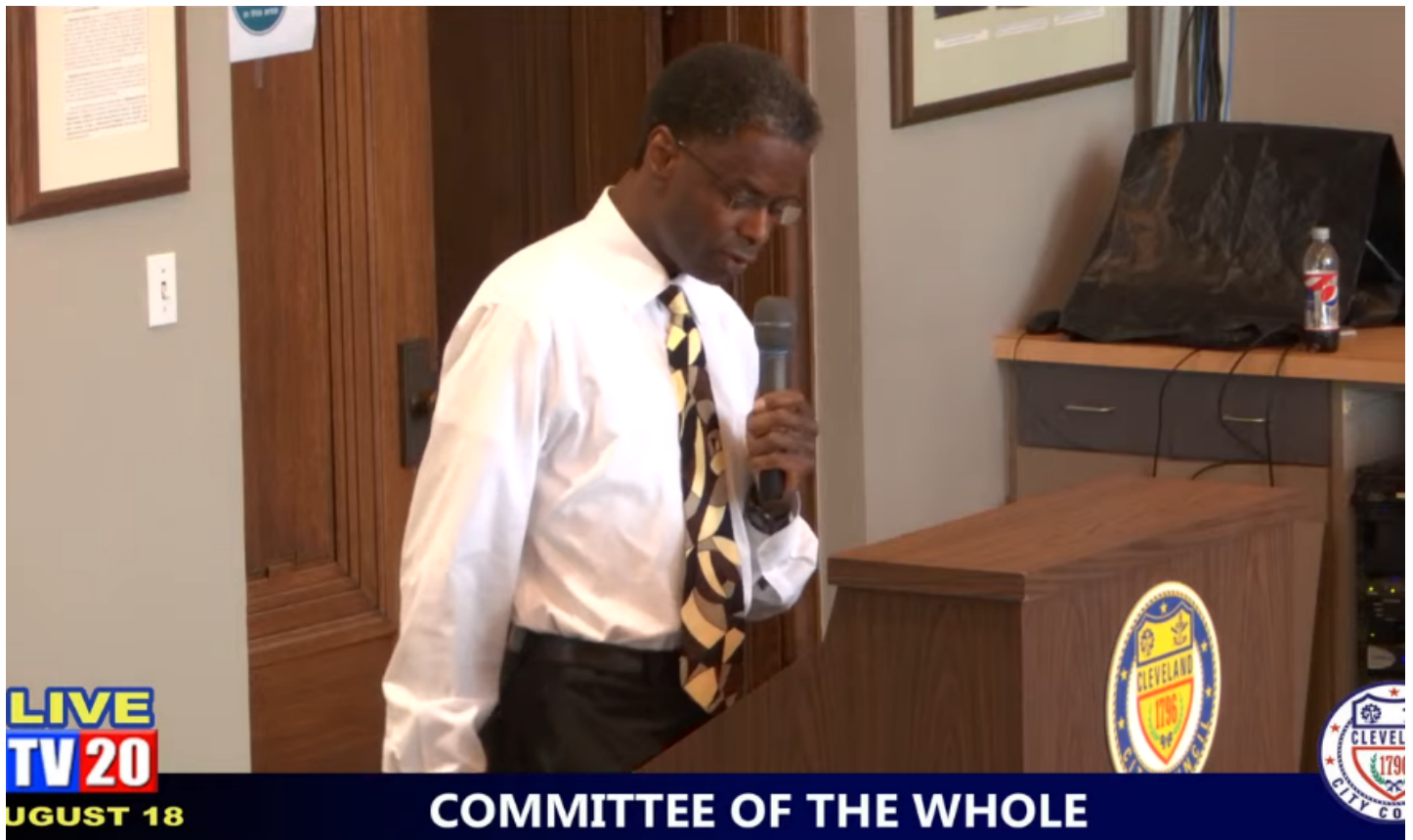
Cunningham, "Now there is a proposal to allow public comment as a rule change. It is however a pale and pathetic proposal."

Cunningham advocates for a petition drive to push the ordinance through without Council if they fail to take corrective action.

David Brock of Ward 16, "Those of us supporting public comment recognize this is no panacea for the issues facing Clevelanders today. There are two primary reasons to issue a clear and consistent policy: PRACTICALITY and SYMBOLISM."



Michael Hardy is present, "Public comment as a rule has limitations. If we want what is best for our City then public comment in the form of an ordinance is what we need. ... Public Comment should be viewed as an asset not as a burden."



Residents speaking on behalf of Clevelanders for Public Comments have ended. Council deliberates briefly.

Ordinance No. 537-2021

By Council Members McCormack and Kelley (by departmental request)

AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE

Authorizing the Director of Aging to apply for and accept one or more grants from the Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging for 2022-23 Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging Programs, including Supportive Services and Aging and Disability Resource Center Programs; and authorizing the director to accept gifts from any public or private entity for the purposes of this grant.

WHEREAS, this ordinance constitutes an emergency measure providing for the usual daily operation of a municipal department; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLEVELAND:

Section 1. That the Director of Aging is authorized to apply for and accept one or more grants in the approximate amount of \$350,000 per year during the grant term, and any other funds that may become available during the grant term from the Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging for 2022-23 Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging Programs, including Supportive Services and Aging and Disability Resource Center Programs; that the Director of Aging is authorized to file all papers and execute all documents and contracts necessary to receive the funds under the grant; and that the funds are appropriated for the purposes set forth in the summary for the grant contained in the file described below.

Section 2. That the summary for the grant, File No. 537-2021-A, made a part of this ordinance as if fully rewritten, is approved in all respects and shall not be changed without additional legislative authority.

Section 3. That the Director of Aging is authorized to accept gifts of cash, materials, or equipment from any public or private agency for the purposes of this grant. The Director is further authorized to file all papers and execute all documents and contracts necessary to receive the funds accepted under this ordinance, and upon acceptance of the funds by the Director, they shall be appropriated for the purposes of this ordinance.

Section 4. That, unless expressly prohibited by the grant agreement, under Section 108(b) of the Charter, purchases made under the grant agreement may be made through cooperative arrangements with other governmental agencies. The Director of Aging may sign all documents and do all things that are necessary to make the purchases, and may enter into one or more contracts with the vendors selected through that cooperative process. The contracts will be paid from the fund or funds to which are credited any grant funds accepted under this ordinance, and cash donations.

Section 5. That this ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure and, provided it receives the affirmative vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

WHEREAS, under Resolution No. 265-2021, adopted May 10, 2021, the Assessment Equalization Board (the "Board") was appointed to hear and determine all objections concerning the estimated assessments under Resolution No. 780-2020, adopted February 3, 2021 (the "Resolution of Necessity"), to provide for public services benefitting The Cleveland Superior Arts Improvement District (the "District"); and

WHEREAS, the Board has filed its report with this Council as to its determination of the objections; and

WHEREAS, this Council deems the report proper in all respects; and

WHEREAS, this ordinance constitutes an emergency measure providing for the usual daily operation of a municipal department; now, therefore

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLEVELAND:

Section 1. That the report of the Board, appointed under Resolution No. 265-2021, adopted May 10, 2021, is approved and placed in File No. ~~538-2021-A~~, along with the final assessments for the District, as equalized by the Board.

Section 2. That it is determined to proceed to provide for the plan for public services benefitting the District (collectively, "District Services"), as established in the Resolution of Necessity.

Section 3. That the District Services shall be performed under the provisions of the Resolution of Necessity, and consistent with the plans, petitions, and assessments approved and filed in the office of the Clerk of Council.

Section 4. That judicial inquiry into all claims for damages resulting from the District Services filed under law shall occur after completion of the District Services.

Section 5. That the cost of the District Services to be assessed against benefited property shall be assessed in the amount, manner and number of installments as provided for in the Resolution of Necessity, as equalized by the Board.

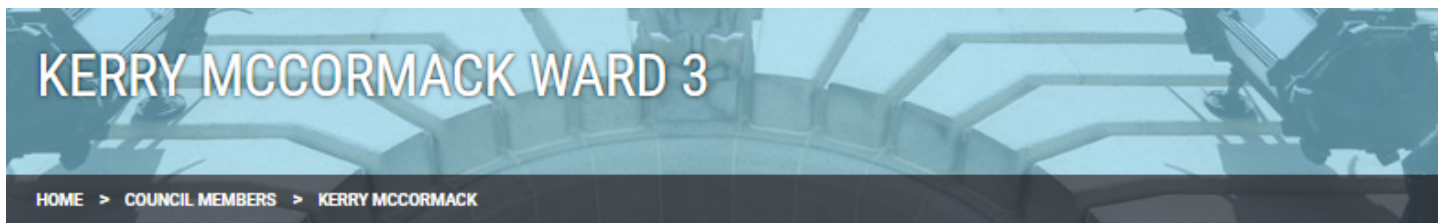

AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE

Authorizing the Director of Community Development to accept funding from the United States Treasury Department for purposes of implementing the Emergency Rental Assistance program established under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021; and authorizing contracts to implement.

WHEREAS, the Emergency Rental Assistance program is established by section 3201 of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Pub. L. No. 117-2 (March 11, 2021) (ERA2); and

WHEREAS, the City of Cleveland is receiving funding from the United States Treasury Department to implement the Emergency Rental Assistance program to eligible Cleveland residents; and

WHEREAS, the amount of funds received for this program is estimated to be \$16,507,009.20; and

WHEREAS, the City of Cleveland wishes to accept this funding from the United States Treasury Department for purposes of implementing the Emergency Rental Assistance Program and to enter into necessary contracts to assist eligible Cleveland residents; and

WHEREAS, this ordinance constitutes an emergency measure providing for the usual daily operation of a municipal department; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLEVELAND:

Section 1. That the Director of Community Development is authorized to accept funding from the United States Treasury Department in the approximate amount of \$16,507,009.20, and any other funds that may become available under this program, to implement the Emergency Rental Assistance Program; that the Director is authorized to execute all documents or contracts necessary to receive the funds under this ordinance; and that the funds are appropriated for the purposes described in this ordinance.

Section 2. That the Director of Community Development shall deposit the funds accepted under this ordinance into a fund or funds designated by the Director of Finance.

Section 3. That the Director of Community Development is authorized to expend funds and to enter into one or more contracts with various community development corporations to implement the Emergency Rental Assistance Program.

Section 4. That the cost of the contracts and expenditures authorized in this ordinance shall be paid from funds approved by the Director of Finance.

Section 5. That this ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure and, provided it receives the affirmative vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

Project Summary

Cross Country Mortgage (CCM) was founded sixteen years ago by Ron Leonhardt and has quickly grown to be one of the nation's largest home mortgage lenders. They have been located in the Cleveland suburbs, but have spent the last few years looking for a larger facility to handle their rapidly growing business.

The CCM team identified property on Superior Avenue and East 22nd Street ("Project Site") in Cleveland and has spent the last several years negotiating and acquiring different pieces of property to consolidate the property. With the property acquired, they plan to create a multi-phased, mixed-use campus that will feature the company's new headquarters as well as a housing development. The project will involve the historic rehabilitation of multiple buildings as well as new construction.

CCM proposes to invest approximately \$37,500,000 in the development of its headquarters and an additional \$18,000,000 in a multi-family development around the project site.

Proposed City Assistance

- This ordinance will authorize the Director of Economic Development to enter into a 30-year non-school Tax Increment Finance (TIF) agreement with CC Superior Holding LLC and/or its designee. The City will have declared certain improvements with respect to the project to be a public purpose and exempt 100% of the improvements from real property taxes.
- The Developer agrees to make certain improvements to the parcel and make payments in lieu of taxes (PILOTs) equal to the taxes that would have been paid for the parcel but for the TIF. A portion of the PILOTs will be paid to the Cleveland Metropolitan School District in the amount the District would have otherwise received but for the TIF by the County ("District Payments"). The

§ 115-1 Office of Professional Standards

There will be within and report to the Civilian Police Review Board an Office of Professional Standards, consisting of investigators appointed by the Board. The Board may appoint the Office's Administrator, in conformity with the Charter's civil-service provisions. The Office's Administrator may not be a current or former Cleveland police officer or Division of Police employee.

The Office of Professional Standards will not be under the direction and control of the executive head of the police force and the Chief of Police, and will report to the Board. The Chief, police force, and executive head of the police force must provide all assistance that the Board and Office of Professional Standards request to enable the Board and Office to carry out their duties. This includes prompt production of all information and records requested, in no case in more than 30 days.

§ 115-2 Civilian Police Review Board

The Civilian Police Review Board shall consist of nine members who represent Cleveland's diverse communities. The Mayor will appoint five members. Council will appoint four members. The Mayor and Council must fill vacancies within 60 days of when they arise. No more than one Board member may be a resident of the same police district, unless the City establishes fewer than nine districts. At
