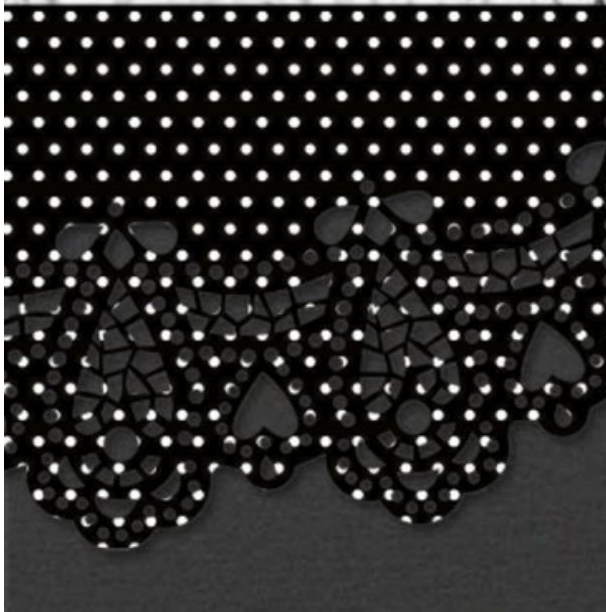
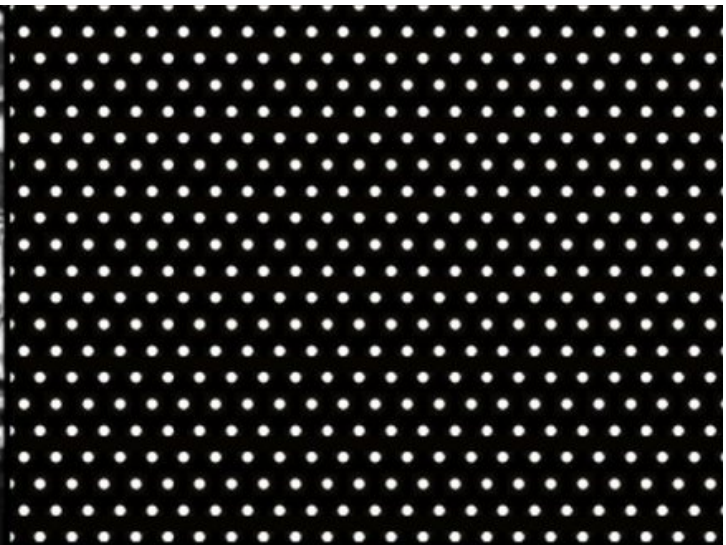

its unmanifested state"



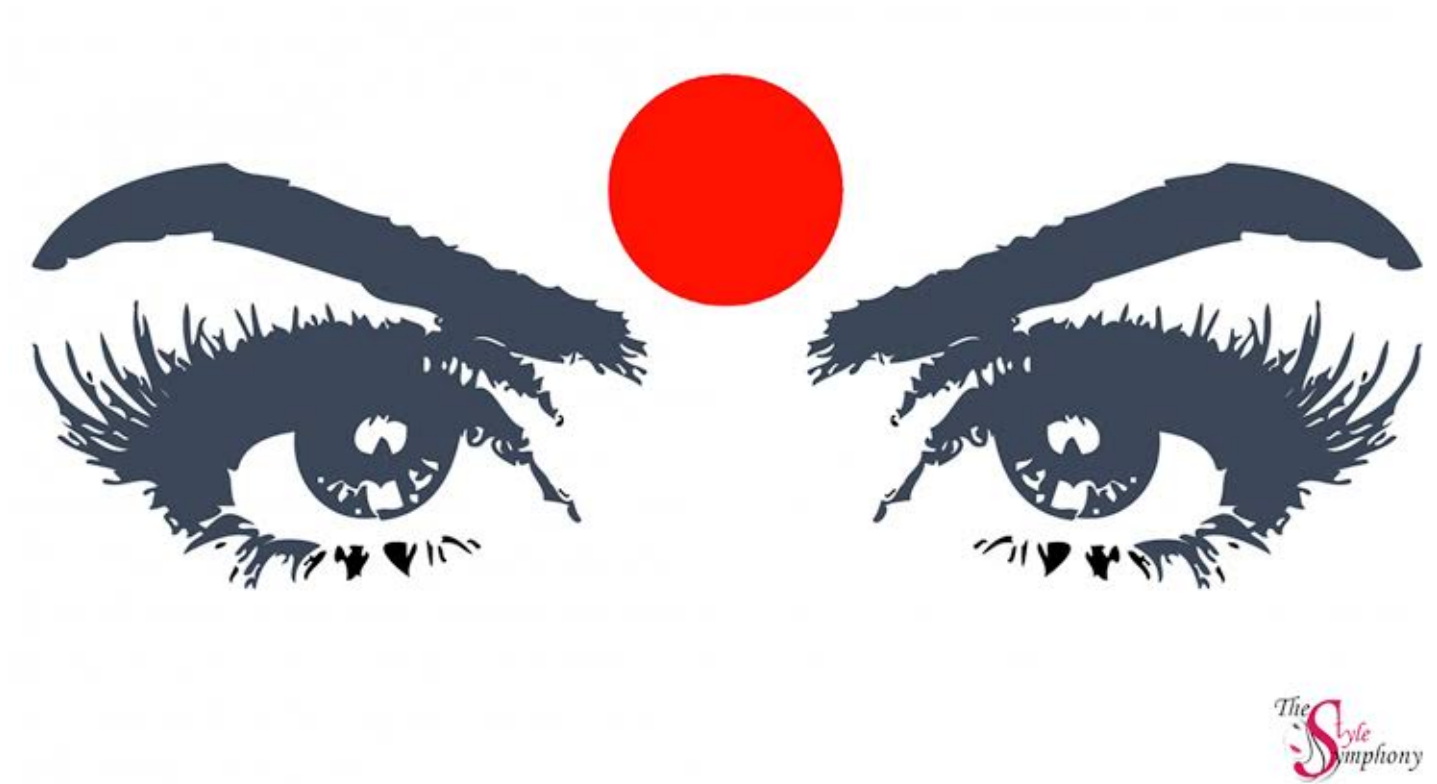

Traditionally the area between the eyebrows (where ■ is placed) is said to be the sixth chakra, ajna, the seat of "concealed wisdom". The bindi is said to retain energy and strengthen concentration. The bindi also represents the third eye & can be

used to ward off bad luck.#Hinduism



One interpretation is a cosmetic mark used to enhance beauty.

In Hinduism the color red represents honor, love & prosperity, hence it was worn to symbolise these aspects. In meditation the point between the eyebrows (Bhramadhya) where one focuses his/her sight, to help concentration.
