In .NET 5, you can preserve references for circular references using System.Text.Json.

But you couldn't ignore them. The 'JsonException' is thrown if circular references have been detected.

Serialization order of properties.

In .NET 6, the 'JsonPropertyOrderAttribute' has been added to System.Text.Json.

It allows controlling the serialization order of properties.

Write raw JSON with Utf8JsonWriter.

.NET 6 introduces the possibility to write 'raw' [#json](#) with System.Text.Json.Utf8JsonWriter.

Useful when you want:

↳ to enclose existing JSON in new JSON

IAsyncEnumerable support.

In .NET 6, System.Text.Json supports 'IAsyncEnumerable'.

The serialization of 'IAsyncEnumerable' transforms it into an array.

For deserialization of root level JSON Arrays, the 'DeserializeAsyncEnumerable' method has been added. [#dotnet6 #json #coding #devcommunity pic.twitter.com/Dnc4uU3AbJ](#)
