
Famine victims worldwide since the 1860s



The excess mortality due to famines shown here is presented in detail on OurWorldInData.org.

For famines that happened at the end of a decade and the beginning of the next decade the famine victims are split by decade on a year by year basis.

For famines for which different excess mortality estimates are published the midpoint between these estimates is shown here.

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3] But hunger remains a massive problem – 11% of the world population are undernourished.


And after decades of progress the share of people that are undernourished has not fallen in recent years.

Share of people who are undernourished, 2000 to 2018




Undernourishment measures the share of the population that has a caloric intake which is insufficient to meet the minimum energy requirements necessary for a given individual.
